Joshua Elimlim recently underwent a heart checkup on October 23rd, and the doctor's report was excellent. Joshua is in good health, his heart is fully healed, and he won't require another checkup until October 22, 2025. It's truly a blessing to see him thriving.

November was a significant month for some of our students. Our Grade 6 and Grade 12 students were preparing to take their national exams, which will determine their academic advancement.

Jane Ekamais, a 13-year-old girl under our care, participated in a field outreach in her home village of Kaemosiring. She shared her dream of becoming a teacher and had the opportunity to give back to her community, demonstrating her leadership and compassion.

Paul Kapo, one of our older House of Hope children, completed his national examinations and excelled. He has now transitioned to college, pursuing a Bachelor's Degree in Education. Paul remains active in the House of Hope programs, particularly during field outreaches, and serves as a role model for the younger children.

The children at the House of Hope returned home to their families on December 17, 2024, following a joyful and memorable Christmas celebration held on December 16, 2024. Christmas was truly a miracle at the House of Hope. Earlier in the year, we rescued ten precious children from unimaginable conditions – some were in life-threatening situations, others hopelessly abandoned. They arrived at the House of Hope fragile and broken, but with time, they were showered with unconditional love, provided with new clothes, three nutritious meals a day, and most importantly, a place to call home finally. These same children had the opportunity to celebrate their first Christmas at the House of Hope. We took them out shopping for their clothes. The joy in their eyes as they selected outfits was a sight to behold – innocent smiles replacing the shadows of their past. We then held a heartwarming Christmas party filled with music, laughter, and gratitude. Meet Dinah Akamais, a 30-year-old woman residing in Ngi'wootome village, located 30 miles away from Lodwar town. Dinah experienced a partial stroke, leaving her with lasting physical limitations. Following the stroke, her life drastically changed. She had to drop out of school in the seventh grade, and her parents lost hope in her future, viewing her as a burden on the family. She subsequently became pregnant with a village boy. Tragically, the father of her child passed away shortly after, leaving her to face motherhood alone. Dinah found herself abandoned and destitute, forced to live on the streets. Eventually, the church members in her village intervened, persuading her parents to accept her back into their home. However, she continued to face hardship, sharing meager meals with her child. When Dinah encountered SERV, a wave of relief washed over her, and she nearly broke down in tears. We offered words of encouragement and provided her with SERV food, which brought her immense joy. She is grateful to Isagenix and SERV International for the renewed sense of hope in her life.

Meet Epeyonon Nabwel, a 56-year-old man from Nabuskaal village. Epeyonon's life has been marked by hardship. He lost his wife several years ago to an unknown illness and was forced to move in with his two daughters. He once owned a few cattle, but they were lost in a raid by a rival community. His daughters, now responsible for their father, resort to burning and selling charcoal to provide for their family. They often go hungry when their charcoal remains unsold. Epeyonon, feeling like a burden, has contemplated ending his life, but his faith in God keeps him hopeful.

During our medical camp, Epeyonon was diagnosed with age-related macular degeneration (AMD), a common eye condition causing vision loss in older adults. The management of AMD depends on its classification as dry (atrophic) or wet. As Epeyonon is blind and complains of itchy eyes, we provided him with medication to alleviate his symptoms. He immediately felt relief after taking the medicine and expressed gratitude to Isagenix and SERV International for the treatment and renewed hope.

Rebecca, a young lady with Down syndrome, and her mother, Asinyen, have faced years of isolation and discrimination due to the stigma surrounding her condition. Villagers often shunned them, believing that Rebecca's disability was a sign of bad luck. This ostracism left them struggling to meet their basic needs and deprived them of human connection. However, our outreach efforts have brought about a remarkable transformation. By showing love, and treating Rebecca with dignity and respect, we have challenged the negative perceptions within the community. As we consistently visit and provide SERV food, not only are we addressing their physical needs but also fostering a sense of acceptance and belonging. Asinyen's gratitude for Isagenix and SERV's support is evident. She shares how the community's attitude towards Rebecca has shifted, and she is now viewed as a normal human being. This newfound acceptance is a direct result of the consistent public displays of love that have been extended to them. By breaking down barriers of prejudice and offering hope, we can empower individuals like Rebecca to live with dignity and purpose.





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
