Meet Joseph Ekiru, an 89-year-old man from Namorunyang village, about 30 miles outside of Lodwar. Recently widowed, Ekiru lives with his granddaughter, who lovingly cares for him. For nearly three years, he's been battling a persistent sore throat, relying on herbal remedies due to financial limitations. The pain has made eating difficult, and sometimes he goes days without food.

We met Ekiru during one of our medical outreach programs. Before conducting any tests, we inquired about his medical history. He showed us his hospital discharge report, which revealed a diagnosis of stage 2 throat cancer. He had received some treatment but could no longer afford the medication. Our doctor provided Ekiru with a full dose of the necessary medication and promised to continue monitoring his condition. Ekiru was overjoyed and so grateful to Isagenix and SERV for being there for him. He went home eager to finally eat the food he had received that day.

Meet Daniel Lomosingo, a 90-year-old man from Namorunyang village. Living alone without any family, Daniel has been a pastoralist his entire life, relying on his animals for sustenance. He never imagined his livelihood would be so drastically impacted. Two years ago, Daniel's family was tragically attacked by a neighboring community while he was away. All his family members were killed, and his animals were stolen. Returning home to this devastating news, Daniel was left heartbroken and devastated. In addition to the loss of his family and animals, Daniel has been struggling with mental illness and pneumonia.

Fortunately, he was open to our help and, after talking with our team, he began to calm down. We were able to provide him with immediate medical care and food support. Daniel now relies on SERV food to survive. He left feeling relieved that under Isagenix and SERV'S nutrition program, he has a lifeline offering hope and sustenance as he faces the challenges of his difficult circumstances.





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
